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#### Dear Fellow Members,

During my tenure as President, which comes to an end this November, there have been some big changes and some stunning shocks. The passing of Art Hipp last year was the biggest by far. Then we faced a financial shortfall and a lack of accurate information about our members that required fast action and a sudden demand of an almost overwhelming amount of additional work on the part of many officers. The decline in commercial surveying activity in most parts of the state contributed additional strains, and these hardships appear to be continuing. I hope for all of our sakes that the Colorado economy turns a corner and improves as rapidly as possible.

The rumors and insinuations that the PLSC is "broke" need to be put to rest — it may have been true late last year, but I'm pleased to report that we have turned that corner and are on a steady path to restoring our accessible funds. Di Askew, our capable Secretary/Treasurer, has contributed a report for the members, which is featured in this issue. As soon as we realized there was a problem, the board began cutting expenses, including meeting and travel costs, lobbyist costs, IT costs, printing costs and other assorted items. Our bank balance is building, and the board will continue to hold the line on costs until we are solidly in the black.

We will incur a major expense for hosting the instructors at the annual Fall Technical Session at the University of Denver, but it is a good investment for everyone — sharpening your skills and knowledge, networking, and learning the very latest from some of the best in our profession, is one of the PLSC's most valuable functions. As you can see from the cover, we have an impressive line-up this year, and hope for the best turnout ever. Thanks to Di Askew, it is easier than ever to sign up and pay for the courses you want by responding to a mailed notice, an email, or by going online to www.plsc.net and using her wonderful new signup form. Detailed information on the courses, the biographical details of each instructor, and more mundane details like parking and hotel accommodations, can all be found right there.

One of the other accomplishments, of which I am particularly proud, is the PLSC effort to improve the surveying program at Metro State College of Denver, including the distance learning program. I was recently named as Chair of the newly constituted Surveying Advisory Committee to represent the PLSC in discussions of some exciting, new directions the college has in mind for the program. An excellent summary of the current status by Carol Svendson is included in this issue. More on this later.

At the request of our Board of Directors, I have called for a Chapter Summit. The Board is concerned about the lack of coordination between the chapters and the statewide organization with finances, legislative initiatives, priorities, IT databases, and hosting of workshops. Also mentioned was the management of scholarship funds, the hiring of a lobbyist to further the causes that benefit everyone, and the lack of Chapter involvement in the parent organization that has led to Chapters doing things independently, exacerbating the above-mentioned issues. We can accomplish far more for each member by pooling our resources and talents, and recognizing that better communication is needed.

It has been a privilege to serve as your President for these last two terms. It has been a great honor that I will remember and cherish for the rest of my life, primarily because I've had the opportunity to learn from so many PLSC directors, officers and members. Each of you are excellent representatives of our ancient profession, and measure up admirably when compared to other professions. I pledge my full support to my replacement, and will always continue to advocate for our society.

# Secretary-Treasurer's Report to the PLSC, Inc Membership

The PLSC has been in financial duress for the past few years; unfortunately the PLSC Board of Directors and the membership had not been keenly aware of this. Our organization has an income of between \$45,000 and \$60,000 from PLSC membership dues, and may bring in \$10,000 in proceeds from the Fall Technical Session each year. We gain some funding from sales of advertisements in the Side Shots Quarterly Journal, and other miscellaneous sources like PLSC logo clothing and the like. Our operating funds are in a checking account with Wells Fargo. We also have a Merchant Account with Wells Fargo for our credit card transactions. The funds in the Merchant Account are disbursed to the appropriate accounts once the transactions for membership dues, PLSC and Chapter conference registration fees, and Side Shots advertising fees have been settled. PLSC also has a security portfolio comprised of Microsoft and Cisco stocks which is managed by Merrill Lynch.

The PLSC also has two scholarship funds, the Colorado Surveyors Educational Foundation, Inc. (CSEF), which was established to fund scholarships and the Roger Patterson Memorial Scholarship Fund, also established to fund scholarships. Most of the CSEF funds have recently been moved from a no interest checking account into a savings account with Wells Fargo. The Roger Patterson Memorial Scholarship Fund is currently 100 percent invested in mutual funds with the Investment Company of America.

To begin, I'd like to share part of the information I provided to the PLSC Board of Directors and the membership at the Fall Technical Session Meeting on November 10, 2007:

#### Overview of the State of the Financial Affairs – November 2007

Art transferred \$20,000 from the CSEF account in August, 2007 to cover expenses. This amount will be returned to the account when funds are available. The spending by the PLSC Board will need to be scrutinized to avoid future shortages in funds. A full report of spending will be distributed to the Board following the finalization of the conference expenses and receipts. All non-essential spending has ceased, however, all existing invoices will be paid.

PLSC Library \$500.00 (PLSC is past due 3 months)
Gene Kooper Executive Director salary \$1000.00 (PLSC is past due 2 months)

Web hosting \$25.00 (current)

MemberClicks \$110.00 (current)

Colorado Real Estate Journal Ad \$175.00 (current) (to be suspended)

Side Shots \$4000.00-\$4500.00 Quarterly

Stamps, printing, misc office expenses, travel expenses

#### Recently suspended monthly expenses:

Peg Ackerman \$1000.00 + expenses

Paul Suter \$1000.00

The PLSC paid Art Hipp \$800.00 per month as the Executive Director of our organization. This amount was slightly increased to \$1000.00 per month when Gene Kooper accepted the position following Art's death in September, 2007. Gene later declined his salary and became a volunteer Executive Director for the PLSC. Lisa Isom reduced the amount the PLSC has to pay for the Bill McComber Library space in her office to \$350.00 per month beginning January 1, 2008 and generously waived any past due amount for 2007. Because the number of printed pages increases the publication cost for Side Shots, we reduced the number of printed pages and offered some of the material for review and download on our PLSC.net Web site, at a savings of \$1,500 to \$2,000 each time we publish the journal. We suspended lobbyist services from Peg Ackerman, publicist services from Paul Suter, and the advertisement in the Colorado Real Estate Journal immediately. The Legislative Committee asked Peg Ackerman to monitor legislation by others and provide the Legislative Committee with weekly reports of activity during the 2008 Legislative Session for \$500 for the entire session. We have asked the members of the Board of Director's and our Delegates to reduce travel related costs as much as possible.

Due to the tremendous efforts of the Board of Directors as led by JB Guyton, the generous donation of space by Lisa Isom, the generous services and donations of time by Gene Kooper and Peg Ackerman, and an all out effort to increase memberships and renewal of memberships, we have struggled our way out of the red, into the black.

It has been 19 years since the PLSC increased the membership dues and advertisement rates in Side Shots. The Board hopes to increase collaborative efforts with our seven chapters to help fund services which benefit the profession overall. We have discussed offering PLSC Logo merchandise on our Web site as well as sponsoring silent auctions of items which were generously donated by Art Hipp's family to the PLSC.

Our Immediate considerations for income are a successful Fall Technical Session in November, sustained efforts to encourage membership renewal for 2008 (we are still 130 members short from last year), increasing membership, working toward online membership renewal (underway), organizing a Chapter Summit to help increase awareness of financial issues, and continued efforts to decrease spending overall.

Together, the PLSC Board of Directors, our seven PLSC Chapters, the 700+ PLSC members, and all of our Surveyor supporting friends (donations of time, money, space, knowledge, and technology) will all be necessary to restore the PLSC financial foundation to help support the needs of our community, our profession, and our future.

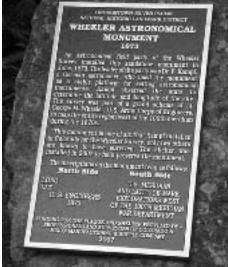
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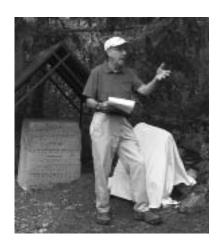

# Shelter and plaque are dedicated at the Wheeler Monument

On July 26, 2008, the Wheeler Monument in Georgetown was the site of a dedication ceremony to celebrate the installations of a protective shelter and an explanatory bronze plaque. About 15 people who supported the project attended the event. Bill Wilson recounted the history of the monument and described the need for a shelter. Weathering is beginning to obscure the inscriptions on the sandstone block, which was installed in 1873. The intent of the steel shelter is to slow the rate of weathering by keeping snow and rain off the top of the block, thereby reducing infiltration of moisture into the pores of the sandstone. The plaque, which is attached to a nearby boulder, gives background information about the monument and transcribes the monument inscriptions.

Wilson thanked the principal donors and others who were involved in the project. The two major donors were the Professional Land Surveyors of Colorado, Inc. (PLSC), and Hixon Manufacturing and Supply Company. Historic Georgetown, Inc. (HGI), supported the project and managed the finances. The following individuals, most of whom were among those present, were recognized for their contributions: Bob and Karin Gibbs, hosts and donors; Pam Fromhertz, National Geodetic Survey; J.B. Guyton, President of PLSC; Gene Kooper, PLSC liaison; Tim Hixon, Hixon Manufacturing and PLSC member; Greg Markle, Clear Creek Surveying, PLSC member, and donor; Gary Long, Long-Hoeft Architects and designer of the shelter; Tim McDonough, Silver Plume Services, contractor and installer of the shelter and plaque; Sharon Rossino, HGI Executive Director; and Matt Skeen, HGI Director and former Chairman of the Board.

After some remarks by J.B. Guyton and Bob Gibbs, Bob did the honors of unveiling the plaque. Bill Wilson concluded the formal ceremony by quoting a paragraph from the Georgetown Courier of May 8, 1909, which stated that champagne was consumed by members of the survey party during the "rites of dedicating the meridian stone" in 1873. It seemed appropriate, therefore, that attendees at the 2008 rites of dedication should retire to a reception that included champagne, and that is exactly what they did!



Editor's note — Lest anyone think that the PLSC was raising their champagne glasses while simultaneously talking about a fiscal "crisis," it must be noted that the \$1,500 donation for the Wheeler Monument preservation to the Town of Georgetown was authorized by the PLSC Board on February 23, 2007, many months before anyone was aware of the impending financial problems. Hixon, Inc. matched the PLSC donation for a total of \$3,000. No similar funding requests have been approved since then, or will be considered until our finances are significantly improved.

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# In Memory of Frank R. Drexel, PLS 1925-2008

Frank R. Drexel was born in Crawford, Colorado, on October 5, 1925, to Frank M. and Grace Drexel. He was the second of three children.

He joined the Army in 1944, serving in the Signal Corp at Camp Crowder, Missouri. He was honorably discharged in 1946. Frank attended the University of Colorado where he met his future wife Karyl. They wed on September 14, 1947, in Boulder, Colorado.

Shortly after, they moved to Delta, Colorado, where Frank worked for the Rural Electrification Association as a Linesman.

In 1950 they returned to Boulder where Frank worked first as an electrician then on a survey crew at Rocky Flats. His surveying carrier started in earnest one day in 1952 when he and Karyl were shopping in downtown Denver and came across an engineering supply store. They went in with a bank account balance of \$700 and came out with a transit, survey equipment, and a bank account balance of \$0. Without much experience, he was luckily mentored by a well established local surveyor named Jack Byron, who was happy to teach Frank the ropes for no reason other than friendship.

Over the following 30 years after finding a passion for surveying, he and his longtime business partner Bob Barrell built the successful engineering company Drexel Barrell & Co. Frank also held the office of Boulder County Surveyor for twenty years and was commissioned as a U.S. Mineral Surveyor.

Frank was an avid boater and was active in the Power Squadron, serving as commander for the Boulder Valley chapter as well as for the district. He took his family to San Diego in the summers, boating on the Skinny Dipper along the California coast. He retired with Karyl in 1982 on the Foxfire and embarked on a two year cruise from San Diego through the Panama Canal to Key West, Florida and back again.

In 1993, Frank and Karyl returned to Colorado, settling in Longmont. Frank enjoyed reading, watching musicals, and rooting for the Denver Broncos. His expectations for life's endeavors were always at the highest level and he sought perfection whenever possible. Frank was a generous, philanthropic soul, eager to help many who needed a fresh start. Frank is survived by his wife, Karyl Drexel, a daughter, two sons, and 6 grandchildren.

# Update from Metro State's Surveying and Mapping Program

Since Dr. Herbert Stoughton's retirement in July of this year, Metropolitan State College of Denver has been working hard to develop a new direction for the program that will respond to current and future needs of the surveying profession. This period of transition is well-timed, with increasing national emphasis on higher education as an important part of preparation for a rewarding career in surveying.

Metro State's Surveying and Mapping program, founded in the 1980s, is the only baccalaureate surveying program in Colorado. In the mid 1990s, facing declining enrollments, Metro State considered eliminating the program. The PLSC, being committed to the importance of higher education, came to the aid of the College with financial, equipment, and scholarship support. Because of the PLSC's help and increasing enrollments through a new distance education option, the

program survived. Many PLSC members continue to serve on the College's Surveying Advisory Committee.

This distance education program, begun in the 1990s in response to low on-campus enrollments, delivers education via DVD to students residing at remote sites. At least half of the students enrolled in the program reside outside of Colorado and many others live outside the Denver metropolitan area. Often these students are already active in the surveying profession and seek to advance their careers by acquiring a bachelor's degree.

With Dr. Stoughton's retirement in July 2008, the College sought the help of Dr. David Gibson, professor of Geomatics at the University of Florida, and an expert on Surveying and Geomatics programs around the nation. Dr. Gibson visited the campus September 11-13 to help us chart a new course. Some of you may remember that Dr. Gibson reviewed the existing curriculum last spring and issued a report on needed changes. During his most recent visit, he helped us with a number of important initiatives including identifying a new home for an updated Surveying program, possibly in collaboration with the GIS and Land Use academic areas. Dr. Gibson also helped us determine a direction for the assessment process which is essential to retaining ABET accreditation. In addition, he met with the newly-constituted Surveying Advisory Committee under the leadership of new chair J.B. Guyton. Dr. Gibson filled the committee in on the status of surveying education around the nation, reported on his campus visits, and got committee members' feedback on possible new program directions. Dr. Linda Curran, Metro State Vice President for Academic Affairs visited the committee meeting, held at the College's South Campus, and emphasized the commitment of the College to continuing and improving the program.

Dave Gibson plans another visit to Denver on November 14 and 15 to help finalize plans for a revitalized Surveying program at Metro State. He is also scheduled to speak on November 15 at the PLSC Fall Technical Session. His presentation is entitled "Fifty Years Out – The Status of Surveying Education in the U.S." Metro State's other plans for Dr. Gibson during the coming year include redesigning the curriculum and developing demonstration online courses.

## Architects Continuing Education / Continued Competency Work Group Update

In my last update, I talked briefly about the formation of a workgroup that the Board charged to develop draft rules for the Board's consideration. PLSC has shown interest by observing this process. The workgroup, consisting of multiple stakeholders to include some of your own membership, made great progress throughout the last few months and the Board published a set of proposed rules for rulemaking at its September 12th meeting. A public hear-

ing on the proposed rules is set for November 14th at the regular Board meeting. You can view the proposed rules and rulemaking hearing information on the Board's website at www.dora.state.co.us/aes/rulemaking.

The next scheduled workgroup meetings will address Board policies that need to be in place in order to specify requirements for architects to comply with the continuing education / continued competency guidelines. The Board is hopeful that there will be a policy in place by January 1st, 2009.

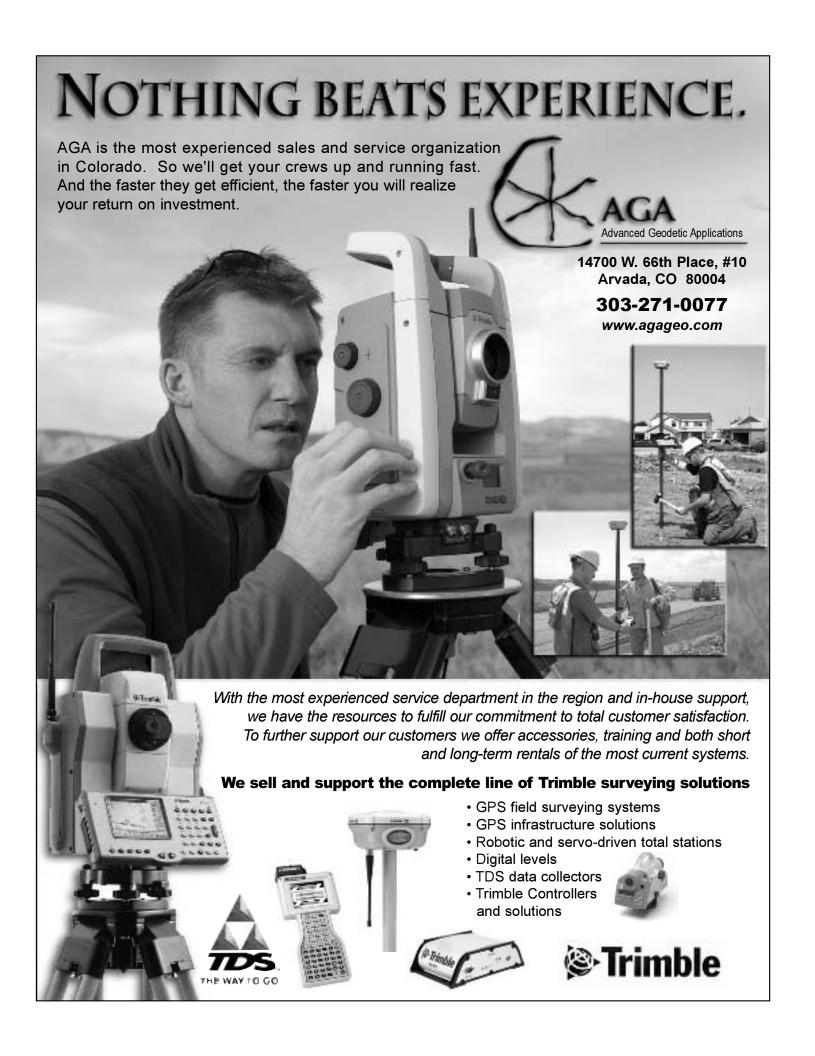

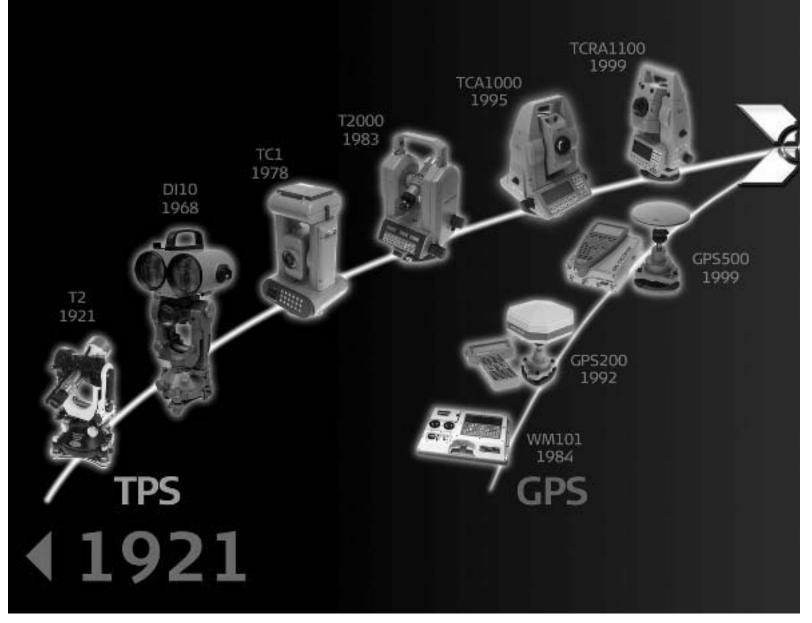

#### **Purpose**

The purpose of this organization shall be to improve the profession of Land Surveying in Colorado. (Article II, Articles of Incorporation)

He/she however may continue to maintain his/her license in effect and shall not be precluded from acting as an expert witness or court appointed commissioner. This is a non-voting classification. The annual dues shall be \$30.00. (Article VIII e., Articles of Incorporation)

**Sustaining Member** --- Any person or firm engaged in a business related to land surveying or interested in the land surveying profession shall, upon contribution of \$200 annually, be a sustaining member of P.L.S.C., Inc., but shall have no voting or office holding privileges. (Article VIII d., Articles of Incorporation)

**Dues** --- Dues shall be due and payable as of January 1<sup>st</sup> for the coming year and shall be delinquent if not paid by April 1st following. Membership rights cease when dues become delinquent. (XVII. Bylaws)

Report on latest developments of the new "Surveying and Mapping Advisory Council" to Carol Svendson, Susan Call, to the Dean of Professional Studies, and to the VP of Academic Affairs at Metro State, including a meeting with Dr. Dave Gibson. The Metro Surveying program offers exciting things and lots of opportunities.

Dave DiFulvio – Report on the status of the MSCD program

Dave DiFulvio takes for floor as the chair of the task force for Metro. The PLSC has worked very hard and spent a lot of money over a lot of time. The initial concern was what is going to happen to the program and the students? Dave was asked by JB to chair a short term task force for up to two months to assist with the Metro reorganization of the program and take a look at the program to ensure long term viability. #### C O M M I T T E E R E P O R T S

#### **Legislative Committee Report**

The Legislative Committee has held monthly meetings since the last report. The committee requested PLSC Board approval of three committee recommendations to change the Colorado Revised Statutes and AES Board Rules at the Board's September 6, 2008 meeting. The PLSC Board did not adopt the recommendations as written and the committee is now waiting for guidance from the Board before proceeding further with these issues. The language proposed by the committee to change CRS 38-51-107, and AES Board Rules 6.5.4 and 6.6 were published in the August, 2008 Side Shots.

The legislative committee is currently discussing possible changes/amendments regarding affidavits of correction as defined in CRS 38-35-109 and related statutes. The committee is looking at whether an addition should be made to the statutes clearly specifying who has authority to complete an affidavit of correction and how these documents should be recorded to assure they are recognized by the public. The results of the committee's discussions will be included in a future Legislative Committee report.

#### **EDUCATION SUBCOMMITTEE REPORT:**

An ad hoc subcommittee was formed in May to evaluate whether the current educational and/or experience qualifications should be increased for new licensees. The committee has developed the following reasons to justify supporting legislation that would increase the existing educational requirements:

- Dramatic changes in technology and reduced opportunities for field mentoring has made traditional apprenticeship an event of the past. At best, the mentoring of years past was an informal process;
- Land surveying in the future will increasingly require more education and experience prior to licensure to safeguard life, health and property and promote the public welfare. There remains little justification for an apprenticeship-only route to licensure; and
- The number of educational/experience pathways should be increased. The existing statutes allow for a four-year surveying curriculum followed by two years of progressive experience, a two year surveying curriculum followed by six years of progressive experience, or a four-year engineering curriculum with a minimum of 24 semester hours of surveying courses followed by six years of progressive experience. Legislation should be considered allowing for a baccalaureate degree other than engineering and a specified number of surveying courses.

The Education Subcommittee proposes that the following education and experience requirements be added to or supercede the current options described in CRS 12-25-214. The new qualifications are proposed to take effect on January 1, 2014:

 A Bachelor of Science degree, plus a specified number of college-level courses in geodesy, boundary law, survey computations and lab, plus 8 years of experience;

- A high-school diploma, plus a specified number of college-level courses in geodesy, boundary law, survey computations and lab, plus 12 years of experience;
- A valid license duly issued by another State, plus a specified number of college-level courses in geodesy, boundary law, survey computations and lab, plus the successful completion of the Colorado State Specific portion of the PLS Exam;
  - A high-school diploma plus 20 years experience.

The Education Subcommittee does not recommend an apprenticeship-only option for future applicants. The committee is undecided on whether to seek elimination of the current apprenticeship option, or increase the apprenticeship requirements to 20 years to reflect the general lack of mentoring that is practiced today.

The recently enacted architects' continuing competency program is being monitored to see if Colorado professional land surveyors should adopt an equivalent program. Gene Kooper is representing the PLSC on an AES Board working group that is developing draft rules to implement the architects' continuing education and competency programs.

The Legislative Committee will be discussing the issues of continuing competency and education at its October 22, 2008 meeting. A report will be prepared for presentation at the PLSC annual meeting. The Fall Technical Conference will include a Saturday morning program in which the AES Program Director, Charlie Adams will discuss the architects' continuing competency program and Dr. Dave Gibson, advisor to the Metro Surveying and Mapping program will discuss the importance of higher education in the land surveying profession. The PLSC has been, "dedicated to the improvement of land surveying education and practice" since its inception. Both the Legislative Committee and the PLSC Board encourage input and opinions from all PLSC members as the PLSC moves forward with possible legislative initiatives on these educational issues.

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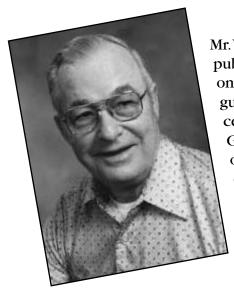
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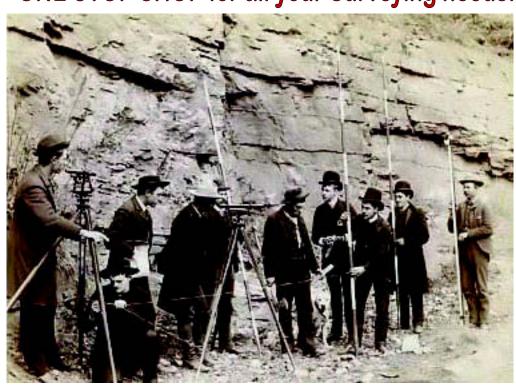
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
